### **Empowering Your Student**

Parents can encourage their student(s) to get involved with student clubs and organizations on campus, and to autonomously seek out the academic support resources of the College. Help student(s) to see themselves as their own best advocate(s), and gently encourage them to solve their own problems using our wide offering of college resources at their disposal.

Additionally, there are many opportunities to be further involved in the community as a parent and family. We recognize that SLC parents and families are equally as creative and dynamic as their students, and we encourage you to bring that ingenuity to Sarah Lawrence! Families support the College and student body by attending virtual and in person events, by acting as ambassadors at Sarah Lawrence events in your home community, by offering internships and career counseling support, and through fundraising activities. ### **Supporting Students Through Academic Transitions**


Sarah Lawrence's unique curriculum and opportunity for academic freedom may be the first time students are fully in control of their education. While it may be the first time you and your students are experiencing this type of education, keep in mind it's not the first time for faculty and staff who will support and advise your student through this transition. The FAQ section of this document provides answers to some common academic questions you and your student may have.

### **Keeping in Touch**

College students are at a time in their lives where their developmental job is to individuate and separate from their family. Allowing your young adult to decrease their frequency of contact with you (even with less frequent texting) can be a way to allow this normative developmental process. While often well-intentioned, daily contact can hinder their ability to generate their own skills of weathering challenges and growing their wings.

Students deal with transitions in different ways, and may need different levels of support from you during this new phase in their lives. Your relationship with your student(s) may change, and that's okay! In order to navigate this expected change:

- Talk with your student before they move in, and make a plan of how often you will check in or talk. But, don't be offended if that plan falls through! Students are busy meeting new people, adjusting to their new workload, and keeping up with new schedules. This doesn't mean they need you any less, just that the ways in which they need you may be changing.
- While you may be tempted to reach out to your student's don or SLC faculty and staff to get a
  sense of how they're doing, please resist. It is important to give your student the space to
  develop their own relationships of trust and mutual respect with their new community.
- Encourage your students to reach out to the resources around them, such as Gryphon Guides, RAs, academic deans, coaches, and dons!
- Affirming to your student that you will remain available to them as needed and are there to support in a non-judgmental way allows them to seek you out as needed.



### What to Expect

- Expect that you may hear from your student less frequently than you are used to when they were living at home.
- Expect them to make mistakes; they are navigating new situations for the first time and this is a learning experience. Remember that some of these mistakes help your student grow as an individual and develop skills for adulthood.
- Encourage them to address their own problems. When you intervene to "fix" your student's
  difficulties versus encouraging them to use the resources on campus, it disinhibits them from
  developing the important skills and strengths of self-advocacy, individuation, and facing
  challenges in their lives.
- Don't panic when they panic. More often than not, the panicked or distressed call home is their
  first step in helping them resolve a situation for themselves. Listen as they describe their
  difficulty and direct them to resources, as well as providing permission to struggle in small
  ways. Sometimes it helps to ask, "are you looking for help with solutions or do you just need a
  sounding board?"

### **First Year Studies**

All first year students are placed in a First Year Studies (FYS) course designed to introduce students to the college's pedagogical approach. These classes are primarily year-long seminar style classes alongside other first year students, with the teacher serving as the student's don (academic advisor) throughout their time at the College. During their FYS class, students participate in one-on-one conferences with their don to develop their self-directed independent work, discuss their academic interests and hone their course of study. Students choose FYS classes from courses offered in nearly all areas of study. ### **Conference Work**

Students at Sarah Lawrence complete conference work throughout each semester for all seminar style classes. Conference work refers to independently driven research projects that reflect a student's own interests as they pertain to the subject matter of their classes. Students work in collaboration with their professors to explore what parts of their class most interest them, resulting in a research based paper or project.. Conference work is rooted in the course's content but students enrolled in seminars or lectures work produce projects ranging from traditional research papers to screenplays.

### **Donning Model - Academic Advising and Planning**

Another aspect of Sarah Lawrence's unique academic model is our Donning system. Dons are academic advisors who work closely with students to build their path throughout their time at the College. First year and transfer students are assigned dons prior to starting classes. This allows dons to meet with their donnees before registration to discuss what classes interest them and help guide them through the registration process. After their first year, a student will meet with their don again during each registration period to discuss their class options. Dons work closely with each student to customize their academic experience at Sarah Lawrence, from exploring study abroad opportunities, to creating an academic path individually catered to their interests.

### **Academic Resources**

### **Library and Research Facilities**

The Esther Raushenbush Library offers a vast selection of resources for students to utilize in their academic studies and beyond. The library offers an extensive collection of books, as well as online resources and databases for various areas of study. Students also have access to the college's archives, the William Schuman Music Library, and the Interlibrary Loan system, which allows students to access resources from schools across the country. The library is home to a variety of study spaces that accommodate both individual and group study. The library also hosts a variety of events, both academic and social, such as research and digital humanities workshops, faculty talks, seasonal events, the SLCPodcast, and even a Library Takeover Party to kick off the school year. Also available for student use are communal sewing machines, a 3D printer, board games, blankets and puzzles.

In addition to the extensive list of the library's physical and online resources, students have access to a devoted support staff. Students can book appointments with librarians for assistance in all phases of their research and digital humanities projects. They can also be trained on using the sewing machine, 3D printing and podcasting.

### **Learning Commons:**

The Learning Commons, located on the main level of the library, offers a variety of academic support services to all students. Academic coaches are available to meet with students to develop their time management, organization, and study skills. Writing mentors meet individually with students to offer organizational, grammatical, and citation tips for any writing-based assignments and conference projects. Peer tutoring sessions include all introductory, and some intermediate, math and science courses, as well as a variety of languages. The LC also hosts a variety of interactive workshops throughout the year on topics geared to support students' academic growth. Please visit our website to learn more!

# **NAVIGATING FINANCIAL SUPPORT**



### **Financial Aid**

The first step in the Financial Aid process is filling out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, or FAFSA. The FAFSA considers parent and student contribution, as well as other factors, to calculate the Student Aid Index (SAI). Sarah Lawrence then determines the student's eligibility for assistance based on the Cost of Attendance and the SAI.

Once financial need is determined, students may receive financial aid awards in the form of institutional aid, federal aid, or state aid. Institutional aid is not determined by the FAFSA, but by the College. Institutional aid does not need to be repaid, and may include merit scholarships and/or needbased Sarah Lawrence grants. Federal and state aid is determined by information provided on the FAFSA, and may include the Federal Pell Grant, Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, and State Grants. Other forms of aid include Federal Work Study, Federal Direct Student Loans, and/or Federal Direct Parent Loans for Undergraduate Students. Students may also apply to outside scholarships, which must be reported to the College immediately.

### **Student Accounts**

### **Tuition & Waivers**

- All resident First Year Students are required to use Meal Plan A, B, or C. Students may change this
  via the student plan meal form on MySLC.
- Student Health Insurance is required unless the student completes the Health Insurance Waiver.
- Tuition Refund Insurance is required unless the student completes the <u>Tuition Refund Insurance</u> Waiver.

### **How to Make a Payment**

All students must complete the Terms of Payment Policy (MySLC login required) before registering.

- Online Payments
  - Online tuition payment is available via Nelnet, which students may access through MySLC.
  - Students can authorize a third party on their Nelnet account who can also make payments and enroll in a payment on their behalf. Authorized parties will receive their own Nelnet credentials to log onto the student account. For more information regarding Nelnet click here.

### **Payment Plans**

Students and families have the option of enrolling in monthly payment plans through the college's electronic billing provider Nelnet. Plans will be available on a semester basis only. Payments will be processed via ACH, or credit card, automatically on the 5th of each month. An enrollment fee of \$55 and a down payment for the first month of the plan will be required at the time of enrollment. Each student may only have one active payment plan per semester.

The dates for enrollment in the payment plan, as well as the dates for each monthly payment can be found on <u>MySLC</u>.



### **Medical Services**

Our staff is specially trained to understand and treat problems that relate to college-age students and their lifestyles. Medical Services is staffed primarily by Family Nurse Practitioners (FNPs) and Nurses while the College is in session.

### On Campus Care:

Students are seen in person at the Health & Wellness Center by clinicians who are available to:

- Diagnose and treat short-term physical illnesses and minor injuries
- Prescribe common medications for acute illness
- Manage sexual health issues, including testing and treatment
- Provide birth control and sexual protection, including emergency contraception (morning-after pill),
   Depo-Provera (DMPA) contraceptive injections and prescriptions for oral contraceptives
- Physical exams (sports, study abroad, clinical rotations)
- Referrals to off campus medical providers for ongoing complex medical needs/illnesses
- Provide information and referrals for PrEP, PEP, Transgender Resources in the local and NYC area

### **Urgent Care:**

During hours that the Health & Wellness Center is open (Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. - 5 p.m.) students should contact the Health & Wellness Center for all urgent care needs. When the Health & Wellness Center is closed, students with serious medical or psychological health concerns may request to be transported directly to the New York Presbyterian Westchester Hospital (formally Lawrence Hospital) Emergency Room by calling SLC Campus Safety at (914) 395-2222. To return to campus from the emergency room, students can call 914-395-2209 (Campus Safety non-emergency line).

There is always a member of the On-Call Residential Staff available (through Campus Safety desk). The staff member can answer questions and put students in touch with health professionals from the Health & Wellness Center when open. To be connected with the on-call staff, students should call Campus Safety (914-395-2209).

### **Medical Transport:**

Medical Transport is an accommodation available to students with documented disabilities or medical conditions who need assistance getting around the Sarah Lawrence campus. Campus Safety manages the Medical Transport system, working closely with Health & Wellness Services, and Access and Disability Services. Medical Transport will always try to provide as close to door-to-door service on campus but it does not transport students to destinations off campus.

### Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS)

Sarah Lawrence College Counseling & Psychological Services practitioners are trained to work with a diverse range of issues and can help students identify treatment goals and next steps. Staff are well equipped at treating the diverse needs of undergraduate and graduate students, and routinely treat students for depression, anxiety, relationship issues, and other psychological concerns. Staff includes licensed psychologists, clinical social workers, and a part-time psychiatrist.

### **On-Campus Care:**

On campus care begins with a tele-health consultation. During this consultation, students and their providers will determine next steps, including:

- Intake appointment.
- Individual psychotherapy sessions.
- Group therapy sessions.
- Let's Talk (20-minute solution oriented support session with a Health & Wellness Therapist.)

A part-time psychiatrist is available for short-term medication management, consultations, and evaluations. Students must have an initial consultation with a staff psychotherapist prior to meeting with the psychiatrist as well as be engaged in ongoing therapy.

### **Off-Campus Care:**

The SLC Health & Wellness Center has a clinical case manager to assist students with referrals for off campus care and understanding the students health insurance benefits. Students can utilize <u>Thriving</u> Campus to search for off campus mental health providers.

### **Additional Mental Health Support:**

The Sarah Lawrence College Health & Wellness Center offers TELUS Health to all enrolled undergraduates and graduate students. TELUS provides all students with immediate, 24-hour support at no cost to the student, regardless of health insurance provider. Students can call or text with a licensed counselor directly from their cell phone from any location.



### **Campus Safety**

The Mission of the Department of Campus Safety is to enhance the quality of life for the entire College Community and the immediate surrounding area by maintaining a secure environment, where the safety of all is balanced with the rights of the individual. Sarah Lawrence Campus Safety Staff adhere to a Campus Community Engagement Philosophy, where our Campus Safety Officers are expected to have positive interactions with our community daily, to enhance the quality of life of the entire college community and its immediate surrounding area by maintaining a safe environment in an all hazards approach in responding to Security, Fire, Emergency Medical and Service calls. The Department strives to accomplish its mission while adhering to its core values of Service, Courtesy and Respect. The success of this mission depends upon an effective working relationship between Campus Safety Officers and the diverse population of Sarah Lawrence College Community, including students, staff, faculty, visitors and surrounding community. Critical to this relationship is mutual respect. Therefore, we pledge to respect the diverse needs and interests of the community we serve while being vigilant in the protection of both persons and property. In return, we ask that our partners in the community assume their individual and collective responsibilities to make Sarah Lawrence College a Safe Campus with the goal of providing a safe haven that fosters an oasis for learning.



Sarah Lawrence College Campus Safety measures include the following:

- 24/7/365 All-Hazard Campus Safety Services
- Campus Safety vehicle, foot patrols and stationary post clearly visible conducting proactive All-Hazard patrols
- Swinford Communications Center staffed 24/7/365 to answer emergency line and communicate with Officers in the field.
- Card Access Control / Fire, Intrusion and Burglar alarms / Surveillance Cameras throughout the Campus, Sprinkler systems.
- Emergency phones located throughout the campus
- Campus Safety operated Campus and Train Shuttle service
- Safety & RADD workshops
- CPR / AED / Basic First Aid Training
- Defibrillators on campus
- Campus Alert emergency notification system (email, text, phone) available to all students, faculty, and staff

Swinford Annex Campus Safety Communications Center (located on the first floor of Swinford Annex) is staff 24 hours a day, 365 days a year and is the central dispatch location for Campus Safety which includes traditional security concerns, Fire Alarm Calls, Emergency Medical Calls and Calls for Service - (Key assist / questions about shuttle services). Supervisors and Officers assigned to the Communications center monitor the emergency and non-emergency phones, campus alarms, Campus wide CCTV, access control and campus vehicles and shuttles via GPS.

### **Emergency Notification System**

Sarah Lawrence College uses Rave Mobile Safety for its emergency notification system. Rave is one of the largest and most respected providers of emergency alert systems to colleges throughout the United States. Rave Mobile Safety is able to deliver messages to students' Sarah Lawrence email addresses and cell phones.

All students, staff and faculty are automatically placed into the system (as long as the college's IT department has your cell phone #) and do not need to manually input their data.

# Building A Community



### Office of Student Involvement and Leadership:

The mission of the Office of Student Involvement and Leadership (OSIL) is to enhance and support the co-curricular experiences of Sarah Lawrence students through involvement opportunities, social activities, and leadership development programming. Tremendous learning happens through involvement in the campus community, and the office seeks to support those experiences through the services and programs we provide. The office's main focus is on helping students get involved and connected on the Sarah Lawrence campus through whatever avenue fits best with their interests and goals.

We have a variety of different organizations, ranging from performance, arts & crafts, jobbies, activism, sport related, identity organizations, publications, academic interests, and more! Getting involved is a great way to meet people, but sometimes it's out of your student's comfort zone. That's where you come in! Encourage them to take that step by attending an event, joining a group, going to an academic talk, or connecting with folks in their Residence Halls. We tell students all the time that college is what you make of it, so just own that it might be awkward at first, and do it!

### Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging (DEIB)

Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging (DEIB) staff plans and presents student-centered programs and events that focus on all aspects of diversity, including but not limited to race, ethnicity, socio-economic status, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity and expression, religion, immigration status, and mental/physical ability.

The office is known on campus for its dialogue series, Real Talk @ SLC, which is a by-students-for-students program focused on understanding and accepting intersectionality.

DEIB is associated with the many identity groups active on campus, listed above, and their office helps to maintain the Identity Spaces on campus, including the Spiritual Space, Common Ground, LGBTQIA+ Space, and the Food Sharing Space.

### **Diversity Advisory and Programming Subcommittee**

The Diversity Advisory and Programming Subcommittee (DAPS) is the advisory, programming, and funding body of the Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. Together with students, student organizations, and staff from across Sarah Lawrence, DAPS strives to continue building a community in which all students are supported, valued, heard and can thrive.



### **Residential Life**

Residential Life at Sarah Lawrence is dedicated to building and fostering community, providing resources, managing housing related concerns, and keeping college residences safe and well supported. We take a residential education approach to our work, focusing on educating students on how to live safely and well in a shared community of which they are all equally part. Through this, we teach and reinforce essential life skills like agency and accountability as well as help prepare students to live, thrive, and drive change in a rapidly evolving world.

Residential Education seeks to teach people how to live well and to enhance their academic experience by providing an enriching residential environment that leads to academic and personal growth. Through learning opportunities and programs for students outside of the classroom, Residential Education programming teaches valuable skills for their personal and professional lives. Our curriculum will be crafted to address various aspects of well-being, connect residents to campus and community partners, assist residents with building their confidence and competence in various skill sets, and help them navigate living independently and interdependently.

We implement Residential Education through multiple processes. Out of our office, we are looking to build a series of passive and active programming that exhibit our themes of well-being and provide educational opportunities to residential communities. We also abide by a conduct process that focuses on the educational aspect of handbook violations. Our office also provides opportunities to our RAs for their own growth and development professionally. Through their dedication to the community, we also empower our RAs to utilize our principles of well-being and skill development to provide engaging peer to peer programming.

### **Career Services**

The Office of Career Services provides assistance with career development and exploration to current students and recent graduates. The office offers several resources that students can start utilizing the moment they join the SLC community.

Career Services offers one-on-one advising appointments. Students can make an appointment for an in-person or online session with one of our career advisors through Handshake, our online platform. Students receive individualized feedback on resumes, cover letters, internship and job search strategies, networking, and interviewing skills.

The Office of Career Services realizes that real world experience is an essential part of skill and career development and encourages students to find internships starting in the summer after their first year. There are several opportunities for students to find internships through this office including our Internship and Volunteer Fair; networking events such as the Internship Initiative Program, Employer Site Visits, and Employer/Alumni Panels; Handshake; or use of our one-on-one appointments. Previously, our students have interned for companies and organizations such as the American Civil Liberties Union, Simon & Schuster, Late Night with Seth Meyers, The Late Show with Stephen Colbert, Mount Sinai, iHeartRadio, the Guggenheim, the International Rescue Committee and more.

Additionally, students may receive academic credit for an internship through fieldwork overseen through their chosen professor or through the SLC EmbeddEd practicum course.

Students who meet eligibility requirements may apply for a Travel Stipend to help offset commuting costs to an unpaid or low paid internship.

Career Services also provides opportunities to speak with our expansive alumni network. Students are encouraged to sign up for SLCConnect, which allows them to engage with alumni and other students in their prospective field.

In partnership with the Office of Alumni Relations, the Office of Career Services hosts alumni networking events both on campus and in NYC for students to meet with SLC graduates thriving in their fields.



### **Global Education - Study Away Programs**

Sarah Lawrence students also have other growth opportunities with our many opportunities both abroad and in the U.S.

The Office of Global Education runs semester and year long programs in Cuba, France, Italy, Japan, UK and the Netherlands. Students may also study at other institutions in the United States. Some of our programs offer specific areas of study such as Theater at the British American Drama Academy in London, England or Filmmaking, Music, Theater, and the Social Sciences in Paris, France at Sorbonne Université, Université Paris Cité, or Sciences Po. Other programs offer a wider liberal arts curriculum.

Students have the opportunity to spend up to one year abroad, either through one year-long program or two different semester-long programs. There are also options for shorter programs for students who wish to only spend a summer away.

If a student is interested in studying in a country in which Sarah Lawrence does not have an established program, the Office of Global Education can assist in finding non-Sarah Lawrence programs. In these situations, however, the student's financial aid package will not be guaranteed. Scholarships are available through some non-SLC programs depending on student need.

Students should consult with the Global Education Office and their dons to plan the best time during their education to go abroad and which program would be best for their interests and development.

The Office of Global Education works with Access and Disability Services to ensure students with differing abilities have the accommodations that they need to succeed in other cultures and countries.

### **Prehealth Program**

The Prehealth Program in the Dean of Studies Office strives to guide and support students each step of the way as they explore and pursue a career in the health professions. Through individual advising, group advising sessions, workshops, and programming, the Prehealth Program provides students with a rich array of academic and advising resources and support. The goal is for students to feel connected, integrated, and supported by our pre-health community of students, faculty, and staff.

The Prehealth program partners with faculty and many campus offices to offer prehealth students academic guidance and scholarly opportunities, access to clinical, research, and community programs, and support preparing for application to health professional programs. Students in the program have significant contact with the pre health adviser, Dean Melinda Perlo Cohen to receive guidance and support.

### **Prerequisites and Recommended Classes**

To meet the course requisites for the majority of health professional schools in the United States, students supplement required courses in biology, chemistry, and physics with additional courses offered by the division, as well as courses in social sciences and the humanities. This coursework will also prepare students to successfully complete the standardized entrance exams (e.g. MCAT, DAT) required by medical and dental schools. In addition, conference work provides students with opportunities to develop original research projects, pursue independent learning, and critically examine professional literature—skills fundamental to future success in health professional programs. ### The Student Pre-Health Alliance of SLC

The Prehealth Alliance, our college's prehealth student organization, serves to promote a community for prehealth students to engage with one another. The alliance is governed by a student board to encourage leadership and teamwork. The Alliance meets bi-weekly and engages in a variety of activities, such as study groups and workshops. In addition, they cosponsor an annual alumni program in the spring open to the entire Sarah Lawrence Community. The Alliance board members also serve as an advisory board to the prehealth program, advised by Dean Melinda Perlo Cohen. The advisory board ensures strong lines of communication between student leadership and the administration to meet the interests and needs of the student community. ### Orientations, Workshops, Guest Speakers, and Other Programs

Each year, the Prehealth Program offers an array of workshops and programs to guide and support prehealth students and alumni, including an annual event with the Office of Alumni Relations. During registration week, the Prehealth program hosts an orientation session for all incoming students as well a session dedicated to returning students. Throughout the year, there are several workshops and programs geared towards supporting students and alumni preparing for their application to medical school.

### **Committee Letter of Evaluation**

Sarah Lawrence students and alumni applying to medical and dental schools are eligible to receive the College's Committee Letter of Evaluation. This institutional letter is composed by our college's pre-health advisory committee which includes our science faculty and administrative deans serves to holistically assess an applicant's level of preparedness and fit for entry into his/her/their desired health professional program. Our Committee Letter of Evaluation is highly valued by health professional schools' admissions committees.

Applicants wishing to receive a Committee Letter of Evaluation must declare their intent to apply in the fall semester prior to the summer in which they plan to apply to medical or dental programs (for example, applicants wishing to apply to medical school in the summer of 2019 to matriculate in 2020, must inform the Prehealth dean of their intent to apply in fall 2018).
